January Meeting Brick Walls by Pauline Critchley Jan 2019.

10 IDEAS TO TRY IF YOU'VE MET A BRICK WALL IN YOUR FAMILY HISTORY

- 1. Talk to others who might be able to help especially the volunteers at the Research Centre. Two heads are better than one.
- 2. Don't accept that other people's research is accurate even if dozens of others have accepted it or you might be barking up the wrong genealogical tree.
- 3. Gobackto your basic information. Be very sure about the facts you have and base further research on these facts.
- 4. Widen your search to other documents such as wills Quarter Session records
- 5. Ensure that you are findingall the variants of the surname.
- 6. If you have multiple candidates (people with the same name) and cannot decide which is your ancestor, try the technique of family reconstitution: grouping all the members of a community or parish into their respective families. This might shed enough light on the individuals to help you determine which one is your ancestor.
- 7. Technique of 'hasping'. If you have a likely candidate, you need to find evidence to ensure that he/she really is the person you are looking for. The candidate should be linked or hasped in some way to the family you are researching, and this link must be recorded to show why this candidate is the right one.
- 8. If you are facing a brick wall for the period 1781to 1831, it is worth looking at the land Tax Assessments which list those who tenanted and PTO

- owned properties and the tax owing. These are held at Preston Archives and the code is QDL.
- 9. If all else has failed or if you just want to try and find out more, it is worth looking at the Churchwardens' Accounts where these exist. They provide a little snapshot of parish life and mention various local people who undertook jobs repairing the fabric of the church. Also, there are the names and signatures of those who took their turn at the office of Churchwarden and of Sidesmen.
- 10. Again, if all else has failed to reveal your ancestor or you want to see a little more detail about circumstances at the time, it is worth looking at the Accounts of the Overseers of the Poor. However, these have not survived for every parish but where they do, they make interesting reading and they include the names of those who received financial relief.

ANCESTRY

Former British Colonial Dependencies, Slave Registers, 1813-1834

In 1807 The Abolition of Slave Trade Act came into force. In 1819 the Office for the Registry of Colonial Slaves was established in London and copies of the slave registers kept by the colonies were sent to this office. Registration generally occurred once every three years. The registers continue through to 1834 when slavery was officially abolished.

FAMILYSEARCH

FamilySearch expanded its free online archives in December 2018 with over 55 million new indexed family history records and over 800,000 digital images from around the world. New historical records were added from England and Ireland.

THE GENEALOGIST

24th January 2019

We have added to our Court and Criminal Records collection with the release of almost 700,000 entries for prisoners. Sourced from the HO 8 Registers held by The National Archives, these documents contain records from the years 1821 to 1876. This expands our criminal record collection to **over 2.3 million individuals**.

Explore more than 800 almanacs and directories from across Great Britain. The collection includes trade directories, county guides, almanacs and general directories. Inside you will find the names of prominent people, tradesmen, people who held office, business owners and local civil servants.
