Talk in November Anne Lowe, 'My Ancestors went to Jericho'. A ramble round this family tree reveals the founding of a family business

Ribblehead Viaduct Blea tunnel was 6-7 miles long. It was 1000 feet above sea level and was built with 1.5 million bricks.

Started by the first workers in 1869 it was crossed by railway officials and families in 1874 and the first freight trains in 1875.



A steam engine arrived from Ingleton station

drawn by horses. It takes 45 minutes to walk across the viaduct. Blea moor common was the last navvie built railway.

Batty Wife Hole village was an early settlement for workers with huts divided into 3 rooms. 1869 there were 1000 men and the settlement included schools hospital etc. In 1874, the nearest Railway Station was Ingleton, where 13380 wagons passed through bringing wood for scaffolding tram ways and other things around the settlement. The TV series Jericho was about the construction of the Viaduct. On the 1871 Census there are various employees such as James Tiplady was a missionary for the railway company and Frederick M Leveson was a surgeon who was born in Kingston Jamaica.

Workers moved round the country with sites. Shoemaker from Devonshire, house-keeper from Warwickshire, saddlers from Yorkshire, policeman from Scotland, ferriers from Kent and horse driver from Somerset all lived there and supported the work on the viaduct.

100 men died and 100 children, some from small pox and some from hypothermia as well as from accidents.

The Jackson family have been traced back to 1750. They were from Sunderland Point and Lancaster and were all blacksmiths.

George and William Jackson are in the Ingleton census of 1871 where Father William was a blacksmith and son George an inn keeper. George married Louisa Tebbutt and was later a Brewers malter Their sons lived in Haverbreak, a posh area of Lancaster, and George left £9655 on his death. Joseph, one of the sons, went to Cambridge and was called to the bar. He left his widow £36,000. the son George died and left £219000 in 1954. James lived at Rydal house and had a son Kenneth and daughter Barbara 1926. The brewing business Yates-Jackson was sold in the 1980's as the family line died out.

Updated UK, WWI Pension Ledgers and Index Cards, 1914-1923 08/11/2018

FAMILYSEARCH

17th Dec 2018 FamilySearch added **1.3 million indexed records** this week. Over 700,000 of these records come from **Peru**; records also came from **Colombia, French Polynesia, Germany, South Africa,** and **North Carolina, Ohio, and West Virginia** in the **United States.**

THE GENEALOGIST

We have just released the maps and field books for the Westminster area in our unique record set The Lloyd George Domesday Survey.

The Genealogist has added to its Court and Criminal Records collection with the release of almost **150,000 entries for prisoners locked up in Newgate prison** along with any alias they were known by as well as the names of their victims.

The Genealogist has added **over 1.5 million individuals** to their Warwickshire Parish Record Collection to increase the coverage of this Midland county for researchers wanting to find their ancestors' baptisms, marriages and burials.

FIND MY PAST

Marriage licenses reveal your ancestor's intended spouse, father's name, and the intended marriage place. The collection consists of a mixture of more than 536,000 handwritten and typed record books from 1115 until 1906 provided by the College of Arms, Anguline Research Archives, and Gould Genealogy.

Fifteen English counties are represented: Bedfordshire, Devon, Gloucestershire, Hampshire, Kent, Lancashire, Lincolnshire, London, Middlesex, Nottinghamshire, Somerset, Suffolk, Surrey, Worcestershire, Yorkshire.

Discover your ancestors who were born in Fermanagh, Northern Ireland, between 1660 and 1978 with over 15,000 parish register entries.

Findmypast has added a new transcribed register of birth records compiled by William Waylett, a male midwife who practiced in Kent between 1757 and 1815.

GRO Certifcate costs

The cost of print certificates will increase from £9.25 to £11, and from £23.40 to £35 for the priority service, which allows delivery on the next working day. The same costs will apply if researchers order the certificate from their local register office. The cost of PDF records will now increase to £7, with priority deliveries available at £45.
