Joseph O'Neill Crime City - Manchester. Find Out About The Manchester Victorian Underworld.

Manchester was worse than London for criminals in Victorian times, but there were only 2 murders in 1898 and 16 in 2016. The tenements and lodging houses were terrible. Gin was one of the main causes of crime and poverty. Some of the cases were amazing. Police went to arrest a man, but he went through the roof spaces to the end of the terrace, took off slates and jumped to the next terrace of houses. He broke through the roof and down the stairs and met two police at the door and leap frogged over them and got away.

The Police force suffered a large turnover, partly due to poor pay. Gangs were a problem but died out in the 1900s. One man, who was mis-shapen and had lots of girlfriends, was arrested for murder, and when the judge pronounced the death penalty, the secretary cried because she was one of the girlfriends!

Here is a sample of the contents of the Chorley Guardian in the First World War, showing both sadness and pride in a Chorley family and how much family information can be found.

Family of Five Soldiers—Extract from Chorley Guardian 27/2/1915

"There is another family in Chorley which is doing a big share towards the defense of this country, and Mr and Mrs Robert Jackson of 18 Arley Street, Chorley, can well be proud of their four sons, who have made a bid for honour. Their names are Robert Jackson, aged 24 years, Joseph, 22: Samuel, 19: and Jesse 17 years of age. The three elder brothers were formerly employed as colliers by Horwich Brick and Tile Co., whilst the youngest, Jesse, worked at Baxendale's foundry.

Robert Jackson has been in the army about four years, he having enlisted in the Northumberland Fusiliers, and at the time the war broke out he was in India with his regiment. They were ordered to return home and accordingly arrived at Windsor. From there they were, three weeks later, drafted to France. The parents of Robert Jackson received a letter from him, but on February 19th a notification was received from the War Office, stating that he was ill, suffering from burns on the face, at the 5th C.C. station in France. He is now thought to be getting on satisfactorily.

The second son, Joseph Jackson, was in the 2nd Battalion of the Coldstream Guards, having joined the regiment about two years ago. On Wednesday his parents received an official intimation from the War Office that he had died at Cuiuchy, Belgium, on February 12th from wounds received whilst in action. Subsequently the following printed letter was received.: - "The King commands me to assure you of the true sympathy of His Majesty and the Queen in your sorrow — Kitchener." In the last letter home, Joseph Jackson stated that his regiment had been getting it very hot, and that he had been very lucky up to then. He had been in the

trenches nine weeks, and had his boots off twice.

The third son, Samuel Jackson, who was in the Territorials has enlisted for the duration of the war, and is at present stationed at Sevenoaks, (Kent).

Jesse Jackson has also joined for the period of the war and he is with the 4th Battalion L.N. Lancashire (Territorials) at Blackpool.

The Father, Robert Jackson, has served 24 years in the Army, 15 in and eight on reserve. The last period expired prior to the Boer War, but Mr Jackson enlisted for the duration of that war in the Royal Reserve. After being in Gibraltar about two years, the Reserve transferred to South Africa, where they arrived at the time peace was declared. For the duration of the present war Mr Jackson enlisted in September 2nd in the 3rd Battalion L.N. Lancashire's, but he was discharged on the grounds of physique about the beginning of December. Determined to be in some regiment he afterwards joined the National Reserves and journeys to Preston every day to put in his drills and rifle practice."
