Centenary of the First World War Battle of Festubert



For two weeks in June, in the Astley Hall Farmhouse's lower Gallery and in the adjacent Chorley Family History Research Centre, Chorley Schools' History Network displayed commemorative research done by local primary and secondary pupils.

During the last year, volunteers from Chorley branch have been helping some of the schools with their research.

Each participating school focussed on a group of men who died at Festubert, especially those from the school's locality or parish. Each display was unique, and included striking examples of the children's interpretations of their research.

Chorley Heritage Centre's linked exhibition, "Chorley and World War 1" continues in the upper room of Astley Hall Farmhouse until the end of August.

Horwich BL6 7BG, on Tuesday 18th August at 7.30 p.m. Horwich Heritage Group was formed in 1985 following a series of public meetings aimed at reestablishing a sense of local pride in the wake of the closure of Horwich Locomotive Works the previous year.

The Society first began holding its meetings in the Public Hall, moving to Horwich Resource Centre in 1990 where its monthly meetings still take place. It opened its first Heritage Centre within the Resource Centre in 1995 and moved into its current premises in 2006. Lancashire Archives: A full searchroom facility is available throughout the working day, Monday-Friday. The Saturday service has an hour of closure over lunch. Amongst recent acquisitions are the sales particulars for the Dutton Manor Estate (DDX 445) The Estate included land in Ribchester, Dutton, Aighton Bailey, Chaigley, Clayton-le-Dale and Thornley-with-Wheatley. Plots are described in detail. The use and value of the land is given, as well as the tenant, making the information a useful source for anyone with ancestors from that area. Photographs of some of the lots are also included.
